Village of Greendale Comprehensive Plan

The Village continues the process of creating a Comprehensive Plan. Before the end of the year, we will adopt a plan that not only satisfies the State's "Smart Growth" Law but more importantly, helps guide Greendale into the future. A Comprehensive Plan is a very important document that establishes a community vision, lays out future land use, and identifies issues and opportunities. A draft version of the plan will be made available for review at the Greendale Public Library, Village Hall, and on the Village's website on October 1.

A critical part of this process is the citizen participation element which provides opportunities for residents to express their ideas, opinions, and concerns. Please participate in this process by attending the public meetings that will be held in the coming months. It is anticipated that the final version of the Comprehensive Plan will be considered by the Board of Trustees on November 17, 2009. All meeting notices will be posted on the Village's website (www.greendale.org), in Village Hall, the Safety Center and at the Greendale Public Library.

Hay Days Fall Festival Saturday, October 3rd

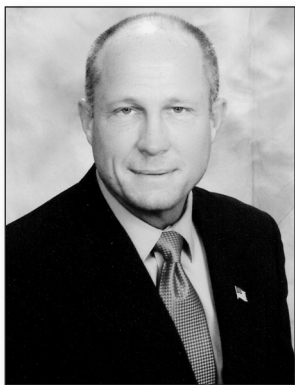

Road Projects

We recently saw the completion of the Grange Avenue project and are now in the advanced planning stages of two other road reconstructions. W. Collect Avenue will be reconstructed from Loomis Road to S. 51st Street. Highlights include new pavement, curbing in select areas, storm water conveyance and storage improvements, a bicycle lane, and grade corrections.

The second project involves the reconstruction of S. 51st Street from Grange Avenue to Loomis Road with the same type of improvements.

Both these ventures will be significantly financed by the federal government with additional funding being provided through cooperative agreements between Greenfield, Greendale and Milwaukee County. Work is now in the design stage and the projects will be bid in the spring of 2010; construction will begin shortly after that. Watch for updates as more information becomes available.

Upcoming 2010 Budget Discussions

October will bring the next round of 2010 Village budget discussions. The public is always invited; we encourage and value your participation. The 2010 budget is certain to be strained by the pending woes in the state and county budgets, as well as the overall economic downturn. Resident participation is critical as the Board of Trustees make budget determinations affecting potential retention, deletion or reduction of community services. We encourage you to attend the following budget work sessions scheduled for Monday, October 19; Thursday, October 22; Monday, October 26; and Thursday, October 29 (only if necessary) at 6:30 p.m. in the Village Hall Board Room, 6500 Northway.

Greendale and America in Bloom

In October we will learn our status regarding this year's America in Bloom (AIB) competition. I believe that we will again place high and stand very tall against other municipalities in this nationwide challenge. As you recall, we won the 2008 competition hands down.

I extend enormous credit to Park and Recreation Director Jackie Schweitzer and our DPW staff for all their work again this year. They are true believers in this effort and added the many

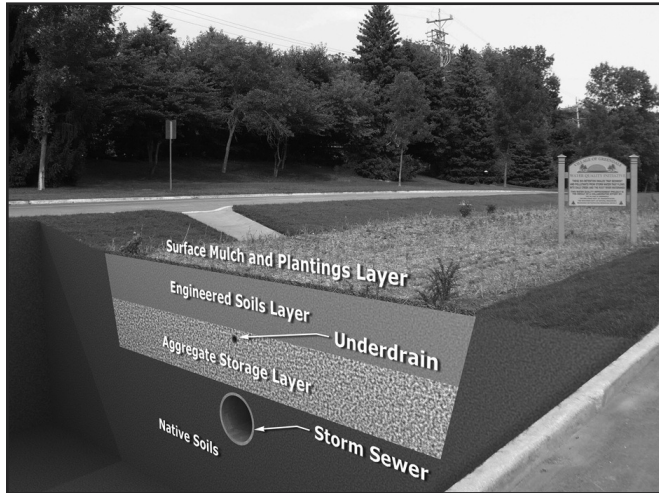

Grange Avenue Bio-Retention Swales

As reconstruction of Grange Avenue comes to a close, a number of people have asked questions about the wildflower-covered medians in a portion of the project. Sections of the new pavement on Grange Avenue have been



shaped to direct storm water toward the medians and into the bio-retention swales. A series of 41 openings in the curb-line equally distribute the water in the filtering area via concrete flumes. After being collected in the swale, the water then percolates through large, native wildflower-covered beds comprised of layers of

engineered soils, crushed stone and sand. The filtered water collects at the bottom of the swale and flows through a series of distribution pipes into Dale Creek.

This bio-filtration device is designed to remove silt and other pollutants from storm water runoff. It is an excavated area that is backfilled with crushed stone (for storage) and an engineered soil mix (consisting of sand, topsoil and compost) that is covered with a layer of mulch and then planted with wildflowers. Storm water

percolates through the mulch and engineered soil where it is treated by a variety of physical, chemical and biological processes that trap pollutants and silt before infiltrating back into the native soil or overflowing into the storm sewer system.

Construction of Grange Avenue bio-retention swales will help Greendale meet Wisconsin's DNR Storm Water Permit compliance goals. The Village is proud to have participated in this beneficial Water Quality Initiative Project, with assistance from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District.

Curbside Leaf Collection Begins October 19th

From October 19 through November 13, the Department of Public Works will pick up leaves at the curbside on your regularly scheduled recycling day. We suggest that you rake your leaves into piles between the sidewalk and the curb and move them into the street (2 feet from the curb) the day before your scheduled collection. DPW will pick up leaves and grass clippings only (no plant materials, twigs, vines, etc.). *Per Village Ordinance Section 11.09, leaves may not be placed in the street after a resident's last scheduled collection day.*

We remind all motorists to be alert to children playing in leaf piles.

Helpful Tips/Options:

- Water-down your leaves after raking to prevent them from blowing back into your yard.
- For easier leaf disposal, cut them up with your mower.
- Bag your leaves and bring them to the Public Works Yard for disposal.
- Do not park your vehicle over a leaf

pile - heat from the exhaust system can cause a fire.

- Do not pile leaves over or within 10 feet of a storm sewer catch basin.

Disposal and Recycling Center 6351 Industrial Loop

The Center is open weekdays 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. and Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., April through November (summer hours). Saturday winter hours are 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., December through March.

When using the facility, be prepared to show your driver's license as proof of residency.

E-Waste Disposal Site

The Department of Public Works accepts e-waste materials Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Computers, monitors, printers, circuit boards and other non-disposable items will be accepted for a fee based on the weight of the item. Call DPW for details (423-2133).

Reminder

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that refuse containers

are to be between 20 and 32 gallons in capacity, have two handles, a detachable cover and not exceed the 50 pound weight limit. Trash bags are always the preferred method of disposal.

Gypsy Moth Control

Gypsy moth egg cases should be removed from the trees and placed in a zip-lock bag filled with soapy water. The bag can then be placed in your residential trash container.

Fair Housing Laws

The Village of Greendale is committed to its support of fair housing in accordance with federal and state laws and local Ordinance 9.27.

The Federal, State and Village of Greendale Fair Housing Laws grant all persons equal opportunity in the sale, rental, insurance or financing of housing. The Federal Fair Housing Laws state that it is unlawful to deny persons housing based on their membership in one or more of the following protected classes: race, color, sex, national origin/ancestry, religion, age, disability, marital status, lawful source of income, sexual orientation or familial status.

Working in conjunction with the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council, the Village regularly conducts training on Fair Housing Laws. This training provides an overview of local, state and federal laws as well as discussions on how rental property practices may be implemented to be in compliance with those laws. Although we strongly encourage rental property owners and tenants to attend this training, it is open to all interested individuals.

Yard Waste Collection

The Department of Public Works now offers residential yard waste collection. For a fee of \$40, residents can schedule a pick-up of up to 2½ cubic yards of material. Yard waste can be parceled in one of two ways:

Bundles — Branches cut to 4 foot lengths and securely tied. Bundles may weigh up to 50 lbs.

Bags — Any yard waste materials can be placed in bio-degradable bags that weigh no more than 50 lbs. each.

You may place any combination of up to 10 bags or bundles at the curb for collection. Call the Department of Public Works at 423-2133 to schedule a pick-up or for more information.

Carbon Monoxide

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas but at high levels, it can kill a person in minutes. Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced whenever any fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood, or charcoal is burned. If appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly, dangerous levels of CO can result. Hundreds of people die accidentally every year from CO poisoning caused by malfunctioning or improperly used fuel-burning appliances. Even more die from CO produced by idling cars.

Tips to Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

- Have fuel appliances checked and maintained annually.
- Ensure that proper combustion and ventilation air is provided for all natural draft appliances.
- Do not run vehicles, snow blowers, etc. in garages.
- Do not run generators, power washers, etc. in the home or basement.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors near sleeping areas.

New Carbon Monoxide Law

Wisconsin and several other states have passed a carbon monoxide law. While this law does not affect single-family residen-

tial homes, it does require carbon monoxide detectors in certain types of residential occupancies including tourist rooming houses, bed and breakfast establishments and any public building that is used for sleeping or lodging (hotels motels, condominiums, apartment buildings, dormitories, fraternities, sororities, convents, seminaries, community-based residential facilities and home shelters, but not hospitals and nursing homes).

Contact the Fire Department (423-2131), the Building Inspection Department (423-2100) or visit the Village's website (www.greendale.org) for an explanation on how this law pertains to new construction (built after October 1, 2008) and existing construction (built before October 1, 2008).

While this law does not require single-family residential structures to have a carbon monoxide detector, the Greendale Fire Department recommends that residents install these detectors adjacent to all sleeping areas and regularly maintain all fuel powered appliances.

Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week is observed during the anniversary week of the Great Chicago and Peshtigo fires. Ironically, both of these catastrophic, deadly fires occurred on the same date - October 8, 1871. Fire-

fighters use this anniversary to emphasize the fire prevention messages that they preach throughout the year.

The Greendale Fire Department has expanded Fire Prevention Week to Fire Prevention Month to accommodate the scheduling of school presentations and tours.

Important Fire Prevention Tips

- Know two ways out of every room.
- If you encounter smoke, crawl low.
- Sleep with your bedroom door closed; it is an excellent barrier to heat and smoke.
- Once you exit the home, stay out and go to a predetermined meeting place.
- If you cannot exit the building, close the door and go to a window.
- Install a smoke detector on every level of your home.
- Check your smoke detector monthly by pressing the "test" button.
- Change the battery in your smoke detector at least once per year.
- Keep matches and lighters in a safe place away from children.
- Talk to children about the dangers of matches and lighters.
- Keep combustibles away from heat sources and candles.
- Do not leave potential fire sources and burning candles unattended.
- Use electricity safely; do not overload outlets.

Radon Awareness Campaign Are radon levels high in your home?

Radon is a tasteless, odorless, invisible, radioactive gas found in a majority of homes in the United States.

It is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the U.S. and is responsible for an estimated 14,000 preventable deaths per year. Your risk increases if you are a smoker.

Exposure to radon can occur in any kind of building and can be a problem in all types of homes with or without a basement. Radon levels vary from house to house. Just because your neighbor's house has low levels does not mean yours does. Testing is the only way to be assured that your home is radon safe. It does not matter how long you have lived with radon - reducing the radon levels in your home will reduce your risk of lung cancer.

The Greendale Health Department has radon kits available for sale. The cost is \$10 per kit, which includes the test results. Upon presenting your results from the radon lab to the Health Department, the \$10 fee will be returned to you.

Call the Greendale Health Department (423-2110) for your kit as our supply is limited. Non-residents can check with their local health departments or kits can be purchased through the mail, at hardware stores, and other retail outlets.
